Everybody's creative drive was on display with a clear passion for the family they have built. They shared with us some of their journey and their thoughts on what it has

been like working with our ever-growing hometown. Showing up at the abandoned hospital being used as a set, Goodday was met by David who took us inside and introduced us to Cory and crew. Coming in on their lunch break, the set was loud and happy as they went about their business, pizza in hand. Our team took to our posts, splitting to gather photos, film, and intel. I joined Cory, Bune, Jason, and Wayne on the upper floors for our chat. Co-Director Cory Haynes, a military vet, and an active police officer, is no stranger to high pressure situations and tactical thinking. Cory says that he has always been interested in the arts and shared that as a kid

he would offer to mow the yard a thousand times to get his dad to buy him a camera. Combining his love of games and media with his knowledge of film production, Cory has pulled up a director's chair for his first short film. He related sympathy for his family, remarking how hard he can be to deal with when he gets excited about a project and said how thankful he is for their support at home as well as the support of the film community that has come together to work with him. Mr. Haynes showed evident pride in his work and the people around him. Speaking to the reception he has received from Mineral Wells he was clear, "Blown away, it has really been phenomenal". Going on to tell me, "I mean...we lost our helicopter, and they stepped up and gave us a list of names." His story prompted a collective sigh of relief from the group; all thankful for the help dodging that bullet. He also mentioned how inspired he is by our city's welcome before he was pulled away for something downstairs.

Bunee Tomlinson is one of the strongest resources Cory has for this project. He is an Emmy award winning director with an eye for character and feeling. When speaking with Bunee, his passion for the work was intense. He was open about being new to this kind of tactical shoot, but excited to help bring these operators to life. Mr. Tomlinson considers himself more than just a guiding hand for Cory's vision. Saying that he is only here to help teach where he can, and that helping people is a big part of what drives him. That selfless attitude is illustrated by his past and continuing work to provide a platform for people, places, and their stories.

When talking about Mineral Wells, Bunee was just as excited about how film friendly the town is, voicing his appreciation for the local attitude and effort that makes it easy for film crews to come in and get to work without extensive red tape. He related how much easier it becomes for a production company to invest in local business and talent when their budget is not blown on permits. Going on to say that "For filming



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in Texas, Mineral Wells. If it fits for location, Mineral Wells, because they are there to guide you...whatever you need."

Director of Photography Wayne Gassmann and UPM Jason Ramirez shared this sentiment. Both have an extended history in media and production. With their extensive film experience, I found their words on the town encouraging. They echoed the words of Haynes and Tomlinson and Wayne went on to say, "I've already talked to a handful of people back in Kansas...if you guys ever need to shoot something, Mineral Wells is gonna be the place to do it."

As my time with everyone came to an end, I rounded out my interviews with David Ly of Body Armor Vent and GBLS CEO Hyun Cho who have each provided backing and equipment for the production. Together they provide some of the most intuitive and comfortable gear that can be used. With Cho bringing in a unique model of airsoft gun featuring, in my opinion, industry changing technology his company has created the safest and most practical looking armament that I have seen for cinema. The inclusion of their DAS (Dynamic Action System)

in a production can negate the need for much of the logistics around hosting, transporting, and using other facsimiles or actual firearms. This goes a long way toward making everyone involved safer.

The film team began calling everyone back before I could get much more from them. Going back downstairs to observe the next scene, I met up with the rest of the Goodday team. A few words and stories were exchanged then we packed to leave. We walked away eagerly looking forward to the final cut, knowing that we are going to see a thrilling short film. My only question left is for ya'll...


back on the winning side against Brownwood at home for Senior Night on Friday 3/12 at 7 pm.

# NATIONAL VIETNAM WAR MUSEUM HOPES TO OPEN INDOOR GALLERY SOON

The National Vietnam War Museum is a major tourist destination for the Mineral Wells area. The museum mission statement is - To promote an understanding of the Vietnam Era, while honoring those who served.

It is a beautiful site that showcases equipment like helicopters, boats, military trucks, a memorial garden maze, and a meditation garden. The latest addition to the property will be an indoor gallery for all to enjoy. Construction on this new building began in 2018. Phase 1 may be completed this year with 18,000 square feet of space. The new building will showcase art based on Vietnam War Era history. There will be paintings, dioramas, murals, large military war crafts, and much more. The museum is to open in phases to allow more space to fully showcase how vital this time period was to many vets and our nation. There are 3 more phases planned to add more exhibits as needed.

Phase 1 specifications as listed in the Development Plan include:

- 2-story building
- 10,000 square feet on ground floor
- Elevator to the second floor
- 8,000 square feet on second floor
- Three exhibits in Phase 1 (can be

- rotated)
- Gift shop
- Restrooms
- Covered porch at the entrance

Construction of this new museum gallery building has been funded entirely by generous donations. In fact, all museum updates and additions have been funded with donations since the Museum opened to the public in 2007.

The National Vietnam Museum got started in 1997 and incorporated as a 501(c)(3) in 2002. Development was slow at first and they opened to the public in 2007 with a meditation garden. Since that time they have added to the location regularly to commemorate Vietnam veterans and their experiences. Camp Holloway, the Navy Garden, a reflection garden, and a Hue Helicopter on a 20ft pole have been added. These exhibits are wonderful attractions for veterans, history buffs, and families to enjoy and learn from.

Jim Messinger, Capt. US Army (ret.) is the Treasurer for the museum and oversees all new projects. He graciously agreed to be interviewed for this story. Jim has been instrumental in making the museum what it is today. Messinger, a Vietnam veteran who piloted helicopters while serving in Vietnam still enjoys flying to this day. "I had a good feel for flying the

helicopter. It is the most fun you can have in the world..." "I was in the army for twenty-four years and I loved it. Every minute of it".

As a child Jim knew he wanted to be a military pilot. Messinger recounts a memory from his childhood, "I wanted to be Audie Murphy. Oh, I knew what the infantry did. I knew what happened in the war. I knew everything about the military. I was in an organization called Civil Air Patrol my entire teenage years." He wore his Air Force uniform with pride.

After returning home Messinger returned to college. Jim earned B.S degrees in Mathematics and Education, and both master's and PhD degrees in Management Science. He decided to give back to future generations by becoming a professor at Weatherford College where he has taught for twenty-four years.

Jim always supported the idea of a Vietnam era history museum for Mineral Wells and jumped at the first opportunity to help. When the Vietnam Helicopter Pilots Association founded a chapter locally Messinger said, " I heard they wanted to do a museum and I jumped up and got to the committee meeting...". From there he hit the ground running by working with sponsors who were willing to help, resulting in the wonderful addition to our community the

museum is today. Jim now oversees all projects in addition to his duties as Treasurer for the museum.

Jim tells a story of a woman he has never met and who has never seen the museum. She is passionate about our soldiers and their time spent serving our country. "Well, this lady calls me from Illinois a couple of years ago and wanted to know more about donating to the museum. And we spent 30 minutes on a phone. And she was thinking about what she wanted to do. Then she called me up and said, 'Well, Jim, I decided. I want to donate \$100,000.00.' Wow! I had never met the woman. I didn't know where she came from, she just called me up." Many donations happened like that. He is enormously proud to soon be opening up a building that will be loved by the community and honors our veterans.

The Lady Warriors finished their impressive season 25-2, including a 7-0 district record, to "finish the mission" according to team members and coaches. They had a goal, win the game they lost last year. That game was the state championship game where they fell short and ended up with a still impressive 2nd place finish. They came out of the gate quickly after tip-off at Lake Country Christian School, and never looked back.

Impressive 1st and 3rd quarters where they more than doubled their opponents scoring is what sealed the deal. 3 Lady Warriors scored in double-digits, Seniors Hena Spahic and Elaina Buchanan, and Sophomore Kate Buchanan. # PPGH Welcomes Chad Pittmon, Neurological Physical Therapy Specialist

Palo Pinto General Hospital (PPGH) welcomed Chad Pittmon, DPT (Doctor of Physical Therapy) to its staff. To celebrate this event, we interviewed Chad and discussed his background and the services that he will be able to provide us in our hospital district.

When asked about his background and what brought him to our hospital, he replied, "I was in the Navy in 2001 steaming hard toward Navy goals and I had a change of heart which directed me back toward a childhood event. I had meningitis when I was a kid and it took me for a toll. I had a therapist who brought me back. I started playing the accordion and the accordion is quite the instrument for recovery. You have gross motor and fine motor (skills) with all the buttons. I had some positive outcomes with that and it carried me on, so, I never did forget that."

"I got busy when I got out of the Navy and started working toward physical therapy. I landed a job at the Neurological Recovery Center in Fort Worth right out of school. That is where things, for me, really took off. I was highly influenced by a super role model/mentor of the highest elevation. He was trained in Cairo, Egypt. Some of the techniques he had perfected over the years had been game changers. When I saw them, I couldn't get past it."

"For a student to see something like a patient who comes in after seeing medical professionals and therapist from DFW and all over the world and after one treatment (the patient) stands up and walks out of the clinic. No one can explain what he did to them and no one can explain how they can see all these other professionals but after only one treatment, they have the outcome they have been looking for 10 to 15 years. I couldn't get over that."

"That's how I came to blossom to who I'm meant to be. Taking the job at Neurological Recovery Center gave me what I needed to get me there. In four years, I rose to the rank of

lead therapist and interim clinical director. I wrote the procedures on a lot of robotic gait trainers and balance trainers at the clinic."

"The clinical model was an entrepreneurial, privately owned corporation type. The clinic changed and had a new vision. I had some land here at Palo Pinto Lake willed to me, so the wind blew me over this direction. I made one phone call to PPGH and that's how it happened."

"I've always had a dream to offer what I had to the rural population. Many of the patients I served came from Weatherford and further west. They would drive from 45 minutes to an hour to get to Fort Worth or Dallas. As I started looking for a job out this way, I saw that there was no neurological specialty training in this area."

"There are reasons for that, but in today's times with stroke prevalence and other neurological complications, you need something or someone that can inspire patients with hope. I'm not talking about going to the physical therapy clinic, getting back in the car and feeling good for 45 minutes to an hour; I'm talking about true sailor change and their are some ways to harbor that now that we know works."

"It's not about what you do as much as how you do it. Everyone knows what works in physical therapy because the research is out there. But, I truly believe when you do things in a certain way, you can maximize outcome."

"Physical Therapy is a skilled profession. People think that you walk in to the therapist office, we look at their knee and we give them a couple of exercises. In actuality, the therapist takes a recommendation from the Doctor and moves it toward autonomy where the therapist declares whether you will need therapy or not. The therapist will take the recommendation, do an examination and evaluate the situation. A plan will then be developed that will include whether or not the client will be more functional in a 6-8 week time frame. Exercises will then be prescribed in order to reach the goals. It is up to the professional to develop a plan that

gives the best scenario for a positive outcome. This skill is developed by the professional over time."

"The benefits of physical therapy vary depending on need. With a sports injury, the benefit is to fully recover from an injury and return to maximum output. In a cardiovascular event, it is to develop and follow a precise therapy plan in order to get the patient back on his feet, become fully functional and back to work"

"Concerning scoliosis, to have the specialty to keep you from going under the knife and prevent the need to have a rod placed in your back. There are different levels of specialty and skills that a patient can get to knowing they have an option of picking a therapist who is more specialized in one area than another."

Chad went on to add, "I think the general public is not as informed in physical therapy as they should be."

In our discussions about the PPGH fitness facility, Pittmon stated, "concerning orthopedic physical therapy, it's near by when the patient

is fresh out of therapy but still needs some guidance in a more non-clinical setting and the therapist can still keep an eye on the patient. The therapist can even step over and help prevent further injury directing them into a positive workout session."

"The advantage of a fitness center in the neurological realm is that therapy has a tendency to go on and on. Unless they are in a maintenance plan, a patient has a 6-8 week program where you are trying to meet certain goals. But they also need something afterwards. When these are in the same clinic, they can continue with help to make an adaptive transition."

The way someone can meet with a physical therapist is to call the clinic. The clinic staff will direct them to a physician who will write an order for physical therapy. The order will be directed back to the clinic and the process will start. The therapist will schedule an evaluation which is where we will decipher a need, evaluate and create a plan.
